Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.

Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

In August, I voted for the *Inflation Reduction Act* because it represented a dramatic turnaround from misguided efforts to pass sweeping, ill-designed legislation that tried to accomplish too many things through budget gimmicks, setting up problematic fiscal cliffs in numerous programs and refusing to make the difficult decisions to allow for a fiscally responsible bill.

The Inflation Reduction Act, which was signed into law by the president, was fiscally responsible and targeted four key priorities: reducing our national debt and putting our country back on a more sustainable path, lowering the cost of prescription drugs, and making health care more affordable, investing in an all-of-the-above energy strategy to significantly increase oil, gas, and renewable energy production to lower energy costs for Americans, and cracking down on the tax avoidance of billion-dollar multinational corporations. This bill was the first major legislation in the last decade to use the reconciliation process to create a fiscally responsible budget to reduce deficits. The Congressional Budget Office estimated it would reduce deficits by approximately \$300 billion.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I also helped pass the Fiscal Year 2023 National Defense Authorization Act, which among other things, included key wins for Bath shipbuilders, UMaine, and servicemembers and their families. For shipbuilders, the bill secured authorization for a third DDG-51 destroyer; established a new contract for up to 15 DDG-51 destroyers over the next five years, many of which will be built at Bath Iron Works; and included funding for shipyard infrastructure. The bill also authorized over \$25 million for defense research programs, including UMaine's large-scale manufacturing program. Finally, the bill authorized a 4.6% pay increase to help servicemembers and their families deal with rising costs due to inflation.

Additionally, at the end of 2022, Congress passed a spending bill to fund the government through September of 2023. The bill funds nearly \$27 million in funding for community projects across the Second Congressional District, a lifeline for our lobster industry that freezes any regulatory action for at least six years, and secures millions in additional funding for the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help Mainers heat their homes.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. Greetings to our friends in Rangeley.

As we enter 2023, I am happy to report that the town of Rangeley continues to benefit from the patrol services of the Sheriff's Office. In 2022, we found ourselves adjusting to an increased workload county wide due to our partners in the State Police completely ending their patrol services in Franklin County.

We answered 150 calls for service in the Town of Rangeley – 32 incidents, 14 arrests, 15 accidents and 89 traffic stops. This is significant considering Rangeley does have a police dept. whom we continue to provide support to. We have a team of dedicated patrol deputies and detectives whose sole purpose is to provide the best possible services regardless of the circumstance, Rangeley's citizens have not suffered. Our deputies' main priorities continue to be the protection of our citizen's personal safety and their property - ever mindful of their civil liberties. Patrolling the town of Rangeley and maintaining a visible presence helps to keep a check on crime.

Rangeley like many other towns, has its share of opioid and alcohol abuse. Citizens also find themselves dealing with domestic violence or mental health crises. Fortunately, there are resources available in our county to help those who may be struggling. Western Maine Behavioral Health provides crises intervention as an immediate response to mental, emotional, and behavioral distress. They also offer an Options Saves Lives Program to help those who want to quit their addition to drugs. Their web page can be reached at https://wmbh-me.com/services. Safe Voices is a nonprofit who are members of the Maine Coalition to End Domestic Violence. They are a wonderful resource to call if you find yourself in a situation where you are seeking non-emergency help. Their web page can be reached at https://safevoices.org/. On our website you can find many other online links to services offered throughout Franklin County.

Our Detention Center provides the best possible services available to a small county by identifying inmates who suffer from addiction and or some type of mental health issue. Once identified, they are given access to appropriate programs that will help them with their condition, which hopefully reduces recidivism.

Our Criminal Investigation Division team of investigators are busy all the time working on major crimes such as sex crimes, burglaries/theft, online fraud, drug crimes and domestic abuse. I wish I could give you more detail about the amount of work our drug investigators are involved with, however given the nature of the business, let us just say that our investigators not only are charging violators here, but also provide intelligence to other agencies that allow them to make arrests in their jurisdictions.

Our investigators and deputies can always use your help though, please feel free to reach out to us anytime on our Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/franklincountysheriffmaine) or our web page (https://www.franklincounty.maine.gov). The interaction we enjoy with the public on these platforms is truly amazing and we've been able to solve crime with your help through these resources. At times an informant does not wish to be involved or named, we understand that an honor that request.

In closing, I want to thank all of you for the support that you have provided over the years to the Sheriff's Office. We could not be as successful as we have been without you as our partner. Your involvement is crucial to assure meeting Rangeley's ongoing needs and goals. Want to get involved? Please go to www.townofrangeley.com and check out the various committees and boards.

Last year, the Board of Selectmen presented on the Town Warrant the chance for voters to approve extra pay from Federal ARPA funds to our employees who worked directly with the public during the COVID public emergency period and to vote on the Town's participation in the Maine Public Employees Retirement System. Both Articles passed decisively, which was a nice show of appreciation for our current employees and MainePERS will help the Town attract and retain future employees.

The Selectmen also pursued some unfinished projects, such as major repairs of the Town swim dock, which will begin in 2024, and a playground upgrade at the Rangeley Town Park, which was slated for a new setup years ago with the Park improvement project, but a shortage of funds allowed only playground safety upgrades. We look forward to seeing children enjoy a new, super-fun playground soon. The Board spent time discussing Oquossoc Park and the needed improvements to that area, including the basketball and tennis/pickleball courts. A Master Plan has been developed to accomplish these repairs over the next few years. An Oquossoc Village Planning Study was also requested regarding traffic, pedestrian safety and other matters named in the Rangeley Comprehensive Plan. We will be able to tap into our Tax Increment Financing (TIF) funds so not all costs will need to be raised to pay for these types of projects. TIF money also allows us to pursue grants to offset costs. Speaking of the Comprehensive Plan, the Board continues to focus on meeting the Plan's goals and outcomes. More members are needed for the Rangeley Comprehensive Plan Review Committee, and until we have enough folks to serve on it, the Selectmen have placed a Review of the Comprehensive Plan on all Town committee/board/commission Agendas, so these groups review their progress and unmet/ongoing goals to update the Selectmen.

Other matters involved the Board meeting with AVCOG (Androscoggin Valley Council of Governments) regarding a climate resiliency plan, Rangeley looks to save money where we can and research green energy possibilities in the years to come.

I've covered just a few highlights. Serving as a Selectman for the Town of Rangeley is never dull, the to-do list is never ending yet that's why we serve- our love for this very special Town we live in.

Lastly, I'd like to close by thanking our Town Employees for all their hard work and dedication. The Board truly appreciates all you do. To our First Responders- thank you for your sacrifices and for being there when the calls come in to respond and assist those in need. These professions take a special person, and we are grateful.

Report of the Town Manager

REPORT OF THE TOWN MANAGER 2022

Greetings, Rangeley Residents.

It has been a productive year. In addition to providing regular day-to-day services, our team has been planning for the future of Rangeley. We have worked on a Fiscal Sustainability Plan for the Wastewater Department, developed a detailed Capital Improvement Plan for the Transfer Station, and we are working on implementing new Code Enforcement software. We have nearly spent the funds from the Road Construction Loans that were borrowed several years ago for needed road upgrades and we are beginning to plan for future road projects.

Rangeley and the Plantations worked with Consolidated Communications to apply for a federal grant to bring reliable fiberoptic broadband service to the region. This effort had no significant cost to the town and the service is now available to most residents. Underground service will be built out during the summer of 2023.

With the help of our consultants and the Maine DOT, we have begun the Oquossoc Village Transportation Study. In a separate but well-timed effort, we are developing a plan to rehabilitate Oquossoc Park. The Town has partnered with the Rangeley Lakes Heritage Trust and the Scenic Byways Committee to apply for grant funding for improvements to the gateways at Depot Street and at the Routes 4 & 16 intersection in Oquossoc.

The year has seen some changes in staffing. I want to thank all employees past and present for their contributions to the Town. Employees are the heartbeat of our operation – they make things happen!

I am thankful for the dedication of our many committee and board members. Their work is crucial to a healthy local government.

As always, I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen for its vision, faith, and support.

Planning Department

Dear Citizens of the Town of Rangeley,

The Planning Department oversees land use planning in Rangeley and is responsible for code enforcement, building inspection, and E911 addressing. The Department provides staff support to the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, and Ordinance Committee. It also maintains records on property parcels in the Town, which could include: building permits, plumbing permits, conditional use permits, subdivisions, or other related documents.

The Planning Department has continued work on Town Code updates and revisions that have been started in years previous. This includes Chapter 38, zoning ordinances, and the beginning research of new ordinances to address innovations happening in the construction and development industries. There are vacancies on the Zoning Board of Appeals and Ordinance Committee. Please consider serving on one of these boards as it allows an opportunity to provide the community with assistance in realizing development plans as well as providing insight for ordinances in progress. Public attendance is always welcome for any board.

Permits are required for most building projects, whether they be local, or state mandated. In general, a permit is not needed for normal maintenance repairs or to replace cosmetic materials including roofing, siding, or windows and doors (within the existing opening). Please contact the Code Enforcement Office with any relevant questions before commencing work.

Appointments are encouraged to guarantee a meeting to discuss projects and answer any questions.

Assessor's Report

Assessor's Report

We have enjoyed serving the Town of Rangeley as its Assessor/Assessor Agents over the last year. We are available at the Town Office two days per week. Please call the office to schedule an appointment. Annually, the Assessor's Office reviews valuations and adjust the valuations that include any additions and deletions. We are also responsible for maintaining accurate records of property ownership. Part of the assessment process includes conducting an annual "ratio study", which compares the actual selling price of property to assessments. The most recent study conducted for the state valuation purposes indicated the assessed values, on average, to be at approximately 100% of market value.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AND PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

Most homeowners whose principal residence is in Maine are entitled up to a \$25,000 reduction in valuation (adjusted by the community's ratio of valuation to actual market sales). To qualify, homeowners must fill out a simple form declaring their Rangeley property as their principal residence by April 1 in the tax year claimed. Once the application is filed, the exemption remains until the owner sells or changes their place of residence. Forms are available in the Assessor's Office.

VETERANS EXEMPTION

Any person who was in active service in the armed forces of the United States during a federally recognized war campaign period and, if discharged or retired under honorable conditions, may be eligible for a partial exemption from taxes on their primary residence.

The Veteran must have reached age 62 or must be receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for total disability, either service or non-service connected.

RECOGNIZED WAR PERIODS

World War I - April 6, 1917 through November 11, 1918;

World War I - (service in Russia) - April 6, 1917 through March 31, 1920;

World War II - December 7, 1941 through December 31, 1946;

Korean Conflict - June 27, 1950 through January 31, 1955;

Vietnam Era – February 28, 1961 through May 7, 1975. For the period, February 28, 1961 through August 4, 1964, federal law restricts the definition of the Vietnam Era war period to relating only to veterans who served in the Republic of Vietnam.

Persian Gulf War – August 2, 1990 to the date that the U.S. Government recognizes as the end of the Persian Gulf War. This period also includes Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom, and Operation New Dawn.

OTHER RECOGNIZED SERVICE PERIODS

February 28, 1961 through August 4, 1964 (Maine property tax exemption applies to all veterans who served during February 28, 1961 through May 7, 1975, regardless of where they served);

August 24, 1982 through July 31, 1984; and December 20, 1989 through January 31, 1990.

Applications forms can be obtained in the Assessor's Office and must be filed with military discharge documentation on or before April 1st of the year it will go into effect.

BLIND EXEMPTION

Residents of Rangeley who are certified to be legally blind by their eye care professional are eligible for a partial exemption from taxes on their primary residence in the town.


This year Rangeley Fire Rescue responded to 608 calls for service and conducted 995 hours of training.

The services we provide are essential to a good quality of life for citizens and visitors alike. We take public services seriously, and we aim to keep our roads as safe as possible.

Rangeley Transfer Station for 2022

Dear Rangeley Residents,


It's our 33nd year of operations at the Rangeley Region Transfer Station. I would like to thank both new and longtime residents for their support and participation of our programs and services.

We have three programs for keeping hazardous materials out of our waste stream.

- 1) our Universal Waste shed that collects mercury containing items like Rechargeable batteries,
-Fluorescent bulbs, Thermometers, Thermostats. There is no charge for this so please recycle.
- 2) Recycling of computers, monitors, and TV's. This is MANDATORY BY LAW.
- 3) Our Household Hazardous Waste Day. This will be held on Saturday August 8th this year. Rangeley/Dallas residents can also bring their material to the Mexico Region 9 School on June 10th, or the Carrabassett Valley Transfer Station on July 8th. All collections are from 9am to noon


Household trash (msw) this year was 1526 tons (up 42 tons from last year), and Oversize Bulky Waste was 421 tons (down 36 ton). Tonnages continue to rise and with increasing costs we are trying to increase what we can recycle.

We shipped out 182 tons of shingles (down 41 tons), and recycled 151 tons of metal (up 3 tons), and 33 tons of tires (up 4 ton).



We recycled 128 tons (up 12 tons) of Zero-sort material. Average cost decreased to \$64.37/ton (down \$26). Materials that can be recycled are:

- 1) Cardboard: boxes/brown bags/juice cartons
- 2) Paper: magazines/catalogs/newspapers/junk mail
- 3) Plastic: #1-7/large rigid plastic/cups/jugs.
- 4) Metal: cans/pie plates/empty spray cans/foil (If Metal kept separate, it earns the Town money)
- 5) Glass: any color bottles and jars

Please don't waste the potential value of these resources. This was our fifth full year of zero-sort recycling and the response for it has been positive. We just ask you make sure it's recycle materials only. Thanks for your support. Our Household Hazardous Waste collection kept 35 gallons of toxic materials out of the landfill helping to keep Maine's groundwater safe, while the Bargain Barn kept 4.8 tons of re-usable items from being sent out as trash. We de-freonized 166 refridgerator/air-conditioners (up 10 units), and we still recycle used motor oil and used cooking oil.

I thank my co-worker Patrick O'Neil and attendants Roger Lowell and Carmen Steward. All the residents and businesses that reduce, reuse, and recycle. The Highway Crew who keep the roads open and sanded in the winter. The Rangeley School personnel who help keep the entire school recycling and Town Manager Joe Roach for their support.






Every town, city, plantation, and municipality in Maine is unique but a common thread ties us all together: **no matter where** we live, Mainers recognize our great state as one large, connected community with shared attitudes of hard work, compassion, and the willingness to help a neighbor in need. Similarly, the state's emergency critical care and medical transport system has its own community, with the shared goal of providing every Mainer the opportunity for the best possible outcome on what is often the worst day of their life. Each partner plays an integral role, including LifeFlight, and together we form the chain of survival.

LifeFlight of Maine is the state's only emergency air ambulance service, with three helicopters, an airplane, and specialty ground vehicles equipped as fully functioning mobile intensive care units. Our Crews bring advanced skills, medical technology, pharmacy, and blood directly to a patient's side, wherever they may be. We do this in partnership with the many 911 dispatchers, fire/rescue, EMS, public safety, law enforcement, and hospitals across the state.

Since its founding 24 years ago, LifeFlight has safely transported more than 35,000 patients regardless of location, insurance status, or the ability to pay for care. These transports include patients of all ages and across all points in Maine. **Since 1998, 104 residents of Rangeley have been cared for by LifeFlight.**

LifeFlight, a non-profit organization, is among the most efficient providers of critical care air medical services, with the lowest costs and charges in New England. To maintain these standards, we rely on support from various funding sources, including individuals, businesses, foundations, and communities. Each year we reach out to every municipality in the state and invite them to support our Community Giving Campaign to ensure that the LifeFlight teams can continue to answer the call for help for Mainers, 24/7/365.

Last year, 194 communities donated a total of \$124,234. This year, we need Rangeley, and all communities to come together to help us reach our collective goal of \$125,000. Your last gift was \$2,000. Will you please consider giving that same amount this year?

Rangeley Water District



Annual Report- 2022

The Rangeley Water District presents a report to the public for the year 2022. The District was chartered by the state of Maine in 1992 but was founded as the Rangeley Water Company in 1905. Countless updates have been made since the water system's humble beginnings, including many sections of ductile iron pipe, valves, hydrants, and meters. The most significant improvements were made in 1997, with the inclusion and installation of a new gravel packed well, miles of new transmission lines, and a 500,000-gallon concrete reservoir.

Continuing the Districts dedication to system upgrades, and improvements, 450 feet of 8-inch water main was replaced under the east section of Cross Street in Rangeley. Along with the new water main, six new curb stops, three 8-inch gate valves, one 6-inch gate valve, and one new fire hydrant were also installed. The Water District worked in conjunction with the Town of Rangeley on the Cross Street project, which resulted in a full resurface, and new drainage on this section of road. Also in 2022, financing, and engineering services were procured for a redundant water main project to take place in the summer of 2023. The Rangeley Water District continues to strive to improve system quality and lessen the chances of interruption in water service within its boundaries.

The plant in Lower Dallas Plantation produced 27,871,200 gallons of water for consumption and fire protection. Water production totals vary from year to year, and 2022 was on par with totals within the previous 5 years. Our office has continued to handle closings as properties continue to change hands steadily within the District. It is, has, and always will be a pleasure to serve our community. Our operators and trustees welcome any and all feedback from our rate payers, and members of the public.

Safe Voices



We have been so fortunate to receive funding and community support from the Town of Rangeley in the past, and this kind of engagement from the communities we work in means so much to our mission and our staff. This year, I am writing to again request funding support.

In addition to the inflation that we are all experiencing (town and city governments included), we have also seen a 40% increase in our call volume compared to pre-pandemic levels. The need for our services is higher than ever, and the demands on our budget bear that out. The support we get from our municipal partners helps bridge the gaps in our funding and ensure that we can provide the services survivors need the most, when they are most needed, no matter when that may be.

Safe Voices has served residents of Rangeley for 45 years, offering a variety of advocacy services for victims of domestic abuse. In the last year we provided support and safety planning to 2,224 individuals throughout our catchment area. We safely housed 90 adults and 47 children. All of these services are **free and confidential**, with the exception of our Violence Intervention Program for those who use abusive behaviors in their relationships.

This year we are requesting \$500 from the Town of Rangeley to continue this vital work and have our services available to residents, including:

- A 24-hour Helpline for victims, families, service providers, & others affected by domestic abuse
- A 17-bed emergency shelter and six-bed safe house for survivors of sex trafficking and exploitation in Androscoggin County, and a new six-to-eight bed emergency shelter with two attached transitional apartments in Franklin County.
- Transitional services, including housing navigation to help survivors find safe, stable housing
- Rural outreach programs: Outreach offices located in Lewiston, Farmington, and Rumford
- Court advocacy: Assistance and support with criminal and civil proceedings
- Education groups for those who batter: The Violence Intervention Program is a 48-week program certified by the Maine Dept. of Corrections
- Community prevention and education in Androscoggin, Franklin, and Oxford Counties

GREETINGS: In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Rangeley, in said County and State, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Rangeley Town Office in said Town on Tuesday, June 14, 2022 at 7:45 a.m. in the forenoon then and there to act by secret ballot on Article A1 to RV1 as set out below, the polling hours therefore to be from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

ARTICLE A1: To elect a moderator to serve for the annual meeting, and to permit the moderator to appoint an alternate, as necessary.

ARTICLE A2: To elect under the provisions of Title 30-A, M.R.S.A. § 2528, the following Town Officers:

Two Selectmen, for terms of three years:



WHEREAS, the Maine Legislature recently enacted several laws intended to encourage development of renewable energy projects in the State of Maine;

WHEREAS, as a result of these new laws, developers are proposing unprecedented numbers of commercial solar arrays throughout the state;

WHEREAS, the Code of the Town of Rangeley, Maine (the "Town Code") does not include any regulations related to commercial solar arrays, and this use would likely fall under the category of "essential services," which receive no substantive review and are subject to few approval standards; and

WHEREAS, the unregulated location and operation of commercial solar arrays within the Town of Rangeley raises legitimate and substantial concerns about environmental, health and safety impacts of such uses, as well as visual impacts and other considerations related to the appropriate siting of these arrays;

WHEREAS, the Town's current ordinances are insufficient to prevent serious public harm that could be caused by the unregulated development of commercial solar arrays;

WHEREAS, a moratorium is necessary to allow the Town to analyze and plan properly for increased development of commercial solar arrays; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Selectmen, Planning Board and Code Enforcement Officer shall study the current Town Code to determine appropriate amendments to address commercial solar arrays; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that such a study, review, and development of recommended Ordinance, changes will take at least one hundred and eighty (180) days from the date the Town enacts this Moratorium Ordinance;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the town meeting of the Town of Rangeley, that the following Moratorium Ordinance on Commercial Solar Arrays be, and hereby is, enacted and, in furtherance thereof, the town meeting does hereby declare a moratorium on the location, operation or licensing of commercial solar arrays within the Town.

For the purposes of this Moratorium, "commercial solar array" is defined as a solar energy collection structure of any size that primarily serves an offsite user such as the electric power grid or a use on a non-adjacent parcel.

This Moratorium Ordinance shall take effect once enacted by town meeting, in accordance with the provisions of the Town Code, but shall be applicable as of July 1, 2023 as expressly provided below. The moratorium shall remain in effect for one hundred and eighty (180) days from the effective of this Ordinance, unless extended, repealed, or modified by the Board of Selectmen, for the express purpose of drafting an amendment or amendments to the current Town Code to protect the public from health and safety risks including, but not limited to, compatibility of commercial solar arrays with existing and permitted uses in residential, commercial and industrial zoning districts.

ORD2 - Commercial Solar Array Moratorium — CONTINUED

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this Moratorium Ordinance shall apply to commercial solar arrays that are proposed to be located within the Town on or after the July 1, 2023 applicability date of this Ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that notwithstanding the provisions of 1 M.R.S.A. § 302 or any other law to the contrary, this Moratorium Ordinance, when enacted, shall govern any proposed commercial solar array for which an application for a building permit, Certificate of Occupancy, site plan or any other required approval has not been submitted to and granted final approval by the Code Enforcement Officer, Planning Board or other Town official or board prior to July 1, 2023, the applicability date of this Moratorium Ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that no person or organization shall develop or operate a commercial solar array within the Town on or after the July 1, 2023 applicability date of this Moratorium Ordinance without complying with whatever ordinance amendment or amendments the town meeting may enact as a result of this Moratorium Ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that during the time this Moratorium Ordinance is in effect, no officer, official, employee, office, administrative board or agency of the Town shall accept, process, approve, deny, or in any other way act upon any application for a license, building permit or any other type of land use approval or permit and/or any other permits or licenses related to a commercial solar array; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that those provisions of the current Town Code that are inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent that they are applicable for the duration of the moratorium hereby ordained, and as it may be extended as permitted by law, but not otherwise; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that if commercial solar arrays are established in contravention of this Moratorium, each day of any continuing violation shall constitute a separate violation of this Moratorium Ordinance, and the Town shall be entitled to all rights available to it in law and equity, including, but not limited to, fines and penalties, injunctive relief, and its reasonable attorney's fees and costs in prosecuting any such violations; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that should any section or provision of this Moratorium Ordinance be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such a declaration shall not invalidate any other section or provision.
